News From The Landscape Committee

If you haven't driven Rockwell lately, you should. The Pampas Grasses are blooming beautiful fluffy plumes! We enjoyed the beautiful blooms of the Crepe Myrtles all summer, but I didn't know if the grasses would produce blooms this first year, so what a treat.

When making our plant choices for the Rockwell perimeter, we tried to use plants that bloomed and provided interest for each season of the year. The Crepes Myrtles will bloom all summer, the Pampas Grasses in the fall and the Nellie Stevens Hollies will have dark green foliage with bright red berries throughout the winter. The Gray Owl Junipers will also stay green during the winter.

Some of the plants in the entrance beds need some time to grow and fill in, but they also need some work and additional plants to look their best. That is why we still need someone to chair the landscape committee.

Many of us on the BNA Board wear multiple hats, but we can only do so much. Please think about volunteering. We are working on proposals for lighting the entrance signs and have plenty of fun landscape projects that need someone to coordinate them. So please let us know if you can help with this committee.
